



M.S. Occupational Therapy – Weekend

A Weekend, 6 Semester Professional Degree Program (75 credit hours)

ADMISSIONS REQUIREMENTS

- Bachelor's degree or higher in any field from regionally accredited institution prior to matriculation.
**COTA applicants with an associate's degree must have completed 90 credit hours (can include all OTA courses) prior to matriculation.*
- A grade of "C" or above is required for all prerequisite courses. AP and CLEP credits are not acceptable for prerequisite coursework.
- Three letters of recommendation from current/recent academic and/or professional contacts are required. Recommenders will complete an evaluation form via OTCAS and upload a recommendation letter. No personal references are accepted.
- Personal Essay: Please write an essay explaining your motivation for choosing a career in Occupational Therapy. Discuss how pursuing this degree aligns with both your short-term and long-term professional goals. Additionally, demonstrate your understanding of Occupational Therapy as a profession. Ensure that your writing is professional and adheres to proper grammar and punctuation.
- Observation hours: In order to obtain an understanding of Occupational Therapy, we recommend shadowing a licensed OT, preferably in multiple settings. While this is not mandatory, it is highly recommended in order for applicants to demonstrate knowledge of the profession.

Interviews will be held monthly September 2025 through June 2026

PROGRAM PREREQUISITES

No more than 9 outstanding credits of prerequisite course work permitted at time of application. Outstanding credits must be shown in OTCAS as courses "in progress" or "planned" and must be completed prior to matriculation.

3	Statistics (Course content must include descriptive and inferential statistics)
6 (minimum)	Human Anatomy & Physiology (Two sequential courses) Content must include lecture and laboratory sections to include human structure and function, including the musculoskeletal system and an overview of the nervous system.
6	Social Science (Two 3 credit hour courses) can include courses in: sociology, anthropology, ethics, economics, political science, community or public health, epidemiology, gerontology, religion, philosophy, gender studies, or cultural or urban studies.
3 (minimum)	Life Span Human Development (Course content must include covering infancy to the elderly; students may have to take more than one course to meet this requirement)
1	Medical Terminology (CEU courses/certificates are not accepted)



DIVISION OF OCCUPATIONAL THERAPY

Shenandoah University's Division of Occupational Therapy (SUDOT) offers an innovative hybrid graduate program leading to a Master of Science in Occupational Therapy. At SU, hybrid education means learning occurs in three environments: online, the classroom, and the community. The majority of didactic content is delivered online through podcasts, interactive learning activities, and cutting-edge e-learning platforms. Classroom-based face-to-face experiences emphasize skill development, small group learning forums, and faculty-student/clinician-student mentoring.

MASTER OF SCIENCE IN OCCUPATIONAL THERAPY CURRICULUM

Shenandoah's Master of Science in Occupational Therapy program is delivered in a hybrid format, with much of the content delivered online. Students attend face-to-face classes at the Winchester location approximately seven weekends over the semester (averaging up to two weekends per month). Clinical and community experiences are incorporated into the on-site weekend learning from the first semester. Level I and Level II fieldwork are scheduled during non-campus days in the student's local region. The MSOT weekend courses run through the summer allowing students to complete the program in two years.

The learning model requires students to think critically and act professionally in independent, interpersonal and community-based problem-solving experiences. Graduates of this program enter the field as passionate, self-reflective learners, critically thinking practitioners, and professionals who understand the importance of ethics, leadership and service.

WINCHESTER LOCATION

The Winchester location is housed in the Health Professions Building located on the grounds of the Winchester Medical Center. The OT facility features multimedia classrooms, plus numerous smaller classrooms and laboratories for demonstrations, problem-solving exercises, and simulations. A low student-to-faculty ratio enhances personalized education. Wireless technology provides instant web access throughout the entire building, including the laboratories, conference rooms, library, and fitness area.

ACCREDITATION

Shenandoah's MSOT program is accredited by the Accreditation Council for Occupational Therapy Education (ACOTE®) of the American Occupational Therapy Association (AOTA) and is located at 7501 Wisconsin Avenue, Suite 510E Bethesda, MD 20814. ACOTE's telephone number c/o AOTA is 301-652-AOTA and its web address is www.acoteonline.org. Graduates of the program will be eligible to sit for the national certification examination for the occupational therapist administered by the National Board for Certification in Occupational Therapy ([NBCOT](http://www.nbcot.org)). After successful completion of this exam, the individual will be an Occupational Therapist, Registered (OTR). In addition, all states require licensure in order to practice; however, state licenses are usually based on the results of the NBCOT Certification Examination. Note that a felony conviction may affect a graduate's ability to sit for the NBCOT certification examination or attain state licensure.
